



Greetings to one and all,

School Term 4 has now commenced, and our HSC students I am sure are busying themselves in the final preparation for their HSC exams. These students together with their families have had to endure much more than any other Year 12 year. In 2020 their Year 11 was interrupted with lockdown together with this Year 2021 more lockdowns, our hearts, thoughts, and prayers are for you in this most extraordinary time of your lives, together, also with all the other Year Classes and families that are finding the home schooling difficult. God bless you all and your families.

So where are we going now as restrictions are being relaxed? Monday 11 October for fully vaccinated people life is going to be more open, than to those not fully vaccinated people, as businesses and other places can reopen. I am sure the barbers and hairdressers will be going full steam ahead. Monday, 25 October, the government has deemed that 80% of people would have been fully vaccinated and all will be open to everyone. Our Archbishop, Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP has asked that all churches remained closed until 80% vaccinated, so from Tuesday 26 October usual times of Masses will recommence, apart from 9.10 weekday Masses, which will revert to 9am. So, to recap: Sunday Masses at St Andrew's Vigil Saturday 5pm and Sunday 9am. Sunday Masses at St Agnes Vigil Saturday 5.30pm and Sunday 10am. Weekdays Masses: St Andrews, Tuesday, Wednesday & Friday 9am and St Agnes, Tuesday, Wednesday & Friday 7am, Thursday 9am. Our live steam Masses will continue Sundays, and we will inform you next week of their times.

I would encourage to you come to church for our Masses when lockdown restrictions are eased. I have missed you all and would love to see you all back to Masses in the Church.

In concern with Sacrament of Baptism a program is being planned and will contact those who have booked in for this Sacrament of Initiation. Regarding the Sacrament of Eucharist for Year 3 and Confirmation for Year 6, dates are being firmed up at present, mindful of the existing Covid and the restrictions in regard, with of capacity of the churches and the 4 sqm rule.

God willing and with the assistance of our Patron, St Agnes, our beautiful War Memorial Catholic Church at Matraville, we will have had a wonderful restoration in a large part, by the end of the lockdown. These restorations, play a role in the Twinned Catholic Parishes of St Andrew & St Agnes, Malabar & Matraville, moving towards the beautifying of our Churches as wonderful treasures, that must be retained, as in the call, to discipleship and the love of God and keeping what our forebears built and retaining them for our future Catholic communities.

As the first session of the Fifth Plenary Council of the Catholic Church of Australia concludes this week, continue your prayers that the Holy Spirit in guiding our 280 members.
